'We want to be strong in happiness, not anguish'

"We just want to be strong in happiness not in anguish ... It only gets harder as time continues on..." For Dina, whose son Ofir was killed by terrorists 13 years ago during his army service, the feeling of loss deepens with each soldier killed.

With the alarming events in Israel over the past six weeks, One-Family Fund is now facing a new urgency; the recent terrifying siege has added hundreds of bereaved and injured families to the more than 12,000 victims the agency already supports.
